2018 Annual Conference



On April 25th and 26th, Child and Family Services of Western Manitoba hosted our Annual Conference on the Human Impact of Childhood Trauma. The conference was presented by Founder and Chief Executive Officer of Alia, **Amelia Franck Meyer**, and by Chief Knowledge Officer of Alia, **Debi Grebenik**.

The conference was split into two days with the first open to the public and the second open to Agency staff only. Over 220 people from a variety of settings attended the first day of the conference on The Human Impact of Childhood Trauma. In attendance were community partners, educators, counsellors, mental health workers, child welfare professionals, and foster parents, among others.



"The focus of the conference was to gain a better understanding of childhood trauma and the behaviours, responses, and grief that stems from it," said Dave McGregor, Chief Executive Officer of CFS Western. All in attendance were urged to consider their own trauma and the ways in which it continues to impact their lives and the work they do. The second day of the conference was open only to Agency staff and was intended to further enhance our understanding and response to children's trauma and that of their caregivers in many instances. "This work around becoming more aware of the impact of childhood trauma and learning the skills to address the resulting behaviours and responses is a step in our Agency's ongoing practice transformation towards a more safety-focused, trauma-informed, and collaborative and strengths-based model of working with children and families," said Dave McGregor.




Annual General Meeting



Staff, partners, stakeholders, and community members attended CFS Western's Annual General Meeting on June 5th to hear about the many significant innovations and changes the Agency has been implementing over the past year. The Agency year in review was led by Chief Executive Officer, Dave McGregor. Following the theme from our 2018 Annual Report, Dave spoke about the Agency's continued commitment to ensuring child welfare and safety through engagement. As is evident in the outcomes and success indicators found in our practice innovations, offering a broad range of services and working collaboratively with families is the most effective and ethical way of 'doing' child welfare.

"Involvement with the CFS system still unfortunately carries a certain stigma and for some is considered a risk factor for families. We need to change this. We need families to get the help they need when they come in to child welfare," said Dave McGregor, Chief Executive Officer. While our Agency has committed to several differential response programs, this work does not happen in isolation. Our Agency is fortunate to be able to collaborate with community partners to ensure that the continuum of child welfare work occurs at a community level as well as within the scope of our Agency.




Sun Fund for Kids

Every summer, many children are lucky enough to experience a summer camp. Camp is a great chance for children to interact with people outside their immediate social circle, build relationships and get out of the house to enjoy some outdoor activities. The Agency facilitates the Sun Fund for Kids which works to give children less fortunate the opportunity to attend camp and experience all that this offers. For over 30 years, through the generosity of public donations, the Fund has helped to send thousands of kids from financially disadvantaged families to enjoy a summer camp adventure.



This year we are happy to say that the Sun Fund saw the amount of children that we were able to send to camp rise from last year. **The total number of children who have received the opportunity to attend camp is 173**! However, camp costs rise every year and so does the need. The Sun Fund strives to send as many children as possible each year but that depends on donations – usually there are more children wanting than there are funds to help. The Sun Fund for Kids needs your help to send even more children to camp next year and to make sure no one gets left behind on a waiting list.

Thank you everyone who was able to participate in the Sun Fund golf tourney this year. It was very successful, raising close to \$8000 for the Sun Fund. Special shout out to our Agency staff who both won cash prizes and graciously donated the money back to the cause! 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Youth Works

Child & Family Services of Western Manitoba has partnered with the Children's Aid Foundation and RBC to kick off a pilot project to give current and former youth in care extra support in preparing and accessing the workforce. Since the launch of the Youth Works program in September of 2017, we have seen some steady growth within our community of youth being employed or even being excited about employment. To date, we have made contact with 53 individuals who have either been in care or are still in care; in and around the Western Manitoba area.

Of these 53 individuals 40 of them have continued to use our program and services, which have led to 13 of them securing employment in the Western Manitoba area. To some, these numbers may not seem overwhelming, but to us it is a success. It is a success because we know that each one of these individuals has come to us with different barriers or challenges working against them; yet they have pushed themselves past these barriers and have been able to uses their skills and talents to gain employment in the communities that they live in.



A majority of these successes can be attributed to our partnership with the CEYS (Career and Employment Youth Services) in Brandon. Over the past 9 months, we have referred several of our youth to CEYS' Helping Employ Youth program and their Work Experience program. These programs aim to assist our youth with the skills needed to obtain and maintain employment and also the skills needed to communicate effectively and respectfully with other members of our society.



I can safely say that the Youth Works Program is a much needed program not just for our Agency, but for the many others we work with within Brandon and the surrounding areas. It has been great to see that staff members from Dakota Ojibway CFS, West Region CFS and Michif CFS have been referring past and present youth in care to our program and we all have one goal in mind - to help these individuals be successful as they head out into a life of independence.

What's New at the ERFRC

The Preschool Enrichment Program will be receiving a brand new Shuttle Bus courtesy of an anonymous donor. The fully customized bus will allow staff to transport children more efficiently and safely over the next several years. We are certainly looking forward to hitting the road with this new vehicle!

In June, Dave McGregor, Arlene Stewart, and Jason Dueck took part in Indigenous Peoples Day. Despite the blistering heat, our group completed the Teepee building challenge and had a lot of fun in the process!

As mentioned at the Staff Conference, the Collaborative Practices Facilitator position will now move from being a pilot project to become a permanent position within the Agency. This is as a result of the process being very effective in supporting the Agency to achieving its mission and goals.





In the first 5 months of the Agency's participation in the Provincial Block Funding project (November 1- March 31), we have experienced both a decrease in days care and a decrease in the cost of care. These 'savings' will now be re-invested by the Agency to strengthen and support our prevention and reunification efforts. This re-alignment of child maintenance (placement) dollars will support the enhancement of community and family-based services which are designed to prevent children and families from needing intensive child welfare services!
