In this newsletter, we are excited to share with you two new practice initiatives we are making at our Agency. Both are designed to improve the outcomes for children and families.

The first is called *Family Finding*. This approach creates urgency within an agency to find and establish family connections for children who are in agency care. Children need these connections to be successful in life following their time in care. Where this approach has been adopted (often mandated in legislation), it has led to improved permanency outcomes for children in care.

The other innovative practice is the introduction of the Caring Dads program. As part of our Safe and Together framework for working with families where there is domestic violence concerns, we realized that we do not have many evidenced informed interventions to offer the fathers. Caring Dads allows us to work effectively with the men who are often the perpetrators of the violence. We recently had two staff trained as facilitators and we'll be offering our first session in February.

I've always been proud of the work of our Agency, but I am particularly proud of where we are today and some of the innovations we are taking in our practice with children and families. Stay tuned for future updates!

Family connections key for kids in care by Heather Forsyth, Rural Resource Development

🖊 few months ago, I was fortunate to attend a week long training workshop called Family Finding—a set of strategies, tools, values and beliefs designed to establish lifelong supports for vouth in foster care.

Kevin A. Campbell, an internationally known youth permanency expert and former long time social services worker, created Family Finding to offer methods and approaches to locate and engage relatives of children currently living in an out-of-home care system. The model's goal is to connect each child with a family, so that every child may benefit from the lifelong connections that only a family provides.



Kevin led the workshop and started with identifying the model's four core beliefs:

- Every young person has an immediate and extended family who can be found if we try.
- Loneliness can be devastating even dangerous—and is experienced by most children and youth in a care system. It is also felt by parents, who may finally lose hope and stop investing in their child's life.
- A permanent, meaningful connection to family and caring adults helps a youth to develop a sense of belonging and hope.

"Our purpose in Family Finding is to restore the opportunity to be unconditionally loved, to be accepted, and to be safe in a community and a

 The single factor most closely associated with positive outcomes for young people is a meaningful, life-long connection to a family and community of support.

Kevin challenged us attendees to grasp that child welfare is a human rights issue. His model intends to give each and every person involved in a child welfare system the connections that will make a difference. He suggested that while shown during our training: Lemn family may not be the primary caregiver, they are the ones who will have some desire to make a lifelong connection. Kevin flushed out the idea of permanency vs. lifetime networks, and built on the design of 'original soil' being required so a person has a sense of their roots, culture, and heritage.

During the week, Kevin showed us several videos that challenged the core beliefs we had and how important relationships are to each individual. He suggested we see a child as one that needs support networks rather than protection or systems that prevent adversity.

The workshop offered us hands-on activities using Kevin's Family Finding model. We heard stories of connections, and people who willingly came back to work with their families in some role. One attendee shared her role of being brought into care and said she had a brother she had not seen since their apprehension. By the next





morning, Kevin had used his networking tools and found the brother living in the United States. The siblings then had their first phone call in over 30 years.

This powerful discussion about the need for at least 40 healthy, reciprocal relationships to keep a human healthy stirred all of us to challenge how we do our work. I encourage everyone to watch several of the YouTube videos Sissay—A Child of the State; *Chimamanda Adichie—The Danger* of a Single Story; and the documentary Place to Place.

This training reinforced for me that lifetime networks are important and they help a person connect to their past and present and have hope for their future. I am very thankful for having the opportunity to attend such a hope filled workshop.

New program helps dads better value their children

Starting Feburary 2017, Child and Family Services of Western Manitoba will launch Caring Dads, an intervention program specifically designed for abusive dads.

"There is a huge gap in services and supports for fathers biological, step, and commonlaw—who have physically or emotionally abused their children, exposed them to domestic violence, or who are at high risk for these behaviours," said **Dave McGregor**, Chief Executive Officer of CFS Western.



"This program will help ensure the safety and well-being of these children by working with the dads whose actions have put the kids in unsafe situations."

Over 17 sessions, *Caring Dads* will help participants:

- develop skills to cope with frustrating situations in healthy ways;
- understand how different fathering strategies and choices affect children;
- increase their awareness of controlling, abusive, and neglectful behaviours; and
- provide them with various approaches to strengthen their relationship with their child/ren.

Caring Dads is the first program of its kind in Manitoba. It has been successful internationally including in Ontario and Alberta. It was the first—and is still one of the only—intervention programs worldwide that is designed to particularly address the needs of fathers who have been abusive to their families. As a result, the program has gained substantial national and international attention.



"Research shows that when fathers are positively involved with their families, children benefit cognitively, socially, emotionally and developmentally," said McGregor.

"Caring Dads is a unique opportunity for dads to help put that into action by connecting in a healthy and positive way with their kids."
